### **NEW FUNDING: ANDAMOOKA BUILDING AN EXCITING FUTURE**

At member and community meetings across the past three years there has been discussion about the need for a functional and localised town management model. Thank you to all those community members who have had their say.

We need more of this talk around town planning, facility management and community programs and services. Come to community meetings and participate.

The Committee have improved the financials and have created some useful income streams. This is improving the value of our community assets and allows us to make good use of these assets. Here, we are talking about the Old PO, the Community Hall improvements, the Camp Ground and the cottages to name a few.

As a community, we have ambition to build Andamooka's population. We also want to be able to provide some basic services for our people, old and young, so they can live fulfilling lives here in the desert.

Together, we have put in place infrastructure for building tourism, improving roads, signage, creating walking trails, a range of visitor services and attractions and visitor information brochures. We have staged some major events with more on the agenda. That means income and employment.

In meetings and at Committee level we have talked about mining and the needs of seniors, young people, families and the arts.

The APOMA committee and the town office staff have been researching, writing and submitting grant applications with some good success With volunteer assistance we have built a very functional and busy community kitchen and put time, money and effort into a new lapidary shed with the aim to encourage new and younger people into the opal industry. We have upgraded the grader shed as a functional town maintenance facility which with the community's support this could evolve into an open access workshop for metalwork, woodwork, and to meet rising interest in mosaics, resin and cold-fired pottery.

This has been a huge effort. Local contractors, CDP workers and independent labourers backed up by the Town Office staff have delivered. It couldn't have happened without our wonderful volunteers. Collectively, they have saved the town around \$100,000 in labour and expertise spread across new projects and programs.

The Community hall improvements have created a multi-functional cultural complex housing an upgraded

and very popular café, a separate youth space and a new community wifi hub servicing both our young people and the "Be Connected" internet programs. .

There are plans for further upgrading of the Caravan and Camp Ground including another shade shelter. It has gone from bringing in around \$7,500 in 2017-18 to \$12,500 in 2019-20, and \$8000 in the first three months of 2020-21. This has required 24/7 availability for managing visitors. Quite a big load in the time of Covid. Thanks to Joe and the "camp ground crew" and the Town Office team. You know who you are.

Right now the APOMA Committee are in negotiation with BHP to support community programs and a second historic cottages restoration. We are also looking for funding to support our recovery from Covid-19 impacts. We lost the general store and access to fuel, and we need to mitigate the effects of that upon on our wellbeing. Rob is doing a great job at the Bottlo by selling most of the basics.

For a long time we have been looking for funding to build a dedicated community leisure facility. Something most small towns have. We can now proudly announce that we have been granted a one off opportunity to fund it using \$305,000 of Drought Relief Funding sourced through our friends at the OCA. The best thing about this grant is we do not have to match it on a dollar for dollar basis. It's new money to the town well over and above what we pay in CCS contributions.

Together, as a community, we are going to need to build a community leisure facility ready for fit out by the end of June 2021. It will have a space especially for young people to hang out (under supervision) another larger flexible activity space, and a passive area supported by a basic kitchen and toilet facilities. It will also have an outdoor sports court. It is going to take a big effort by all of us to bring this one home. Please let us know if you can offer any assistance. We need labour, equipment, landscaping expertise, cement workers. We also need to lay artificial turf, install insulation, install cladding to structures and a myriad of other construction jobs.

The ball is in our court.

# **KEEPING UP WITH BUSINESS**

# CRUNCH TIME FOR ANDAMOOKA NO MORE SITTING AT THE CROSSROADS – IT'S TIME TO ACT

In community meetings and newsletters for the past year, the Committee have promoted that Andamooka is now in a stable financial position with a solid foundation in place upon which to build our future, but that we are sitting poised at a crossroad looking for the right way forward...

We as a community now need to take that momentous step forward onto a new road that can lead to a sustainable and vibrant future, or choose to keep to the same circular route we have travelled for the past decade and risk going backwards, or simply do nothing and be taken down a road we may find finishes in a dead end.... So, it's decision time.

Much has been achieved in this past five years by the committee and town office staff supported by a band of dedicated volunteers. Significant grant funding has provided for new developments in community facilities and programs. Income streams have been established despite the negative effects of Covid-19 restrictions.

But this effort is not sustainable for the long term under the current town management model which expects so much from so few, and new developments (and new money) continue to increase the workload.

Over the past decade several different approaches to town management have been introduced, some succeeded in part and others have not survived, but ultimately these have not fundamentally changed the pressure upon the Committee.

To assist change we have established a support team of experts that we work with for advice and guidance on such aspects as finances, insurances, compliances, property management, development and planning, business development, tourism and town management.

The advantage of them being familiar with the community, committee and town office and with the towns strengths and issues is of great value in assisting our progressive approach to a new management model.

But on Friday 9<sup>th</sup> October the APOMA Committee made a stand for a new way forward. It has largely been prompted by the fact that the town has been impacted by recent business closures and that we have not received any nominations for the APOMA committee. We realised that the very fabric of this township and our community is under threat of collapse and could leave us in a position of having little income, no necessary insurances, and no staff or town office.

#### HOW CAN WE PREVENT THIS?

We need members of the community to take stock of this situation, and in traditional Andamooka style, to *work* together. If we do nothing we will have to take whatever alternative the OCA comes up with.

Think of what we place at risk:

- The hall complex and all that goes with it,
- The café,
- The splash pad,
- The Wi-Fi education programs,
- The lapidary workshop
- The retail shops,
- The camp ground and its income
- The community bus,
- The seniors and youth programs
- The community events
- The cleaning and maintenance programs.

Grants would need to be handed back which would represent a loss of over \$600,000 in new one-off grants that did not require a \$1 for \$1 contribution from APOMA, including \$305,000 for the new community leisure facility. These special grants are not likely to be offered again.

#### HOW DID WE GET TO THIS POINT?

Andamookans are a freethinking and creative lot, and although the committee were already feeling the pressure and seeking change, as a community, we weren't particularly happy with the town management model introduced in 2012 which took away the local approach and replaced it with government management via the OCA. We also saw the introduction of the Community Contribution Scheme (CCS) which has, despite some controversy succeeded in delivering benefits to the town and community.

After an initial flurry of development and associated funding within two years the approach diminished to a 'taking care of business' model undertaking general maintenance, day-to-day administration and recruiting contractors at 'government rates' often managed out of Port Augusta, the cost of which chewed into community funds raised by the CCS.

From 2017-18 APOMA gradually took on various responsibilities for town management which are now administered by a local part time staff working within the Town Office, a move which has resulted in better service delivery and less costs leaving funds to invest in other projects.

Since that change a lot has been achieved to bring the town alive. The APOMA committee has been re-organising the way things are done.

#### THE NEXT STEP:

The APOMA Annual General Meeting will now take place on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> November to allow people more time to give sound consideration to our proposed new approach.

So what is this new approach?

We want to spread the load. We want to recognise and empower the existing active groups within the community and have them represented at committee and we want them to do their groundwork supported by town office staff.

This approach allows the peer groups to identify leaders so those leaders don't necessarily stand alone and it creates clear lines of command between the town office and the committee.

Please take time to discuss this approach with your interest group whether it be tourism and events, the arts, in local business, employment, training and town development, in projects, community programs and activities, or opal mining.

# TIME FOR ANDAMOOKA TO FORGE AHEAD

### A new way of doing things....

#### Do we need a new way forward?

There is no need to re-invent the wheel – just modernise and adjust the one that is already turning to the advantage of the town.

Covid-19 and recent major events have exacerbated the need to get this new approach in place and to ensure our own brand of democracy. We need solutions for a new local general store, new fuel supply and new business opportunities in tourism, events, the arts, community infrastructure and projects and the community leisure facility.

#### Taking a step back to go forward:

On April 20 the Committee made strong representation to the OCA in about the very real vulnerabilities and limitations within the current system. The OCA are now in the middle of a review of their work in the Outback. They are looking to change the way they do business. So are we.

Year on year we have sustained casualties:

- Individual committee members have vacated their position on the committee out of frustration, or an inability to cope with the pressures
- Or sometimes because they just get tired and worn down.
- Many members of the community are either reluctant to or choose not to attend community meetings.
- Social media has its unkindnesses...

But social media has also changed the way we do things, so that can be used to advantage and make being on the committee easier for members who are time poor or spend time 'out of town'. It can connect us easily with groups and with those who can offer advice or services.

#### HERE IS OUR PROPOSED WAY FORWARD:

Basically, the proposed new model is a simple system, based on the way Andamooka has traditionally done things, and it brings depth and inclusiveness from across the community into town management.

Its success relies on members of the community with an interest in particular activities working together in informal working groups from which a member is chosen to be nominated onto the APOMA Committee to represent the ideas, views and needs of that interest group. This does not exclude individuals who have the passion and or skills to offer, from being nominated for a position on the committee.

The new model would be flexible enough to provide for on-line meetings or for individual electronic attendance, and for discussion or

audiences with experts to assist groups or the committee with research, planning and decision-making. Under this model, the groups would do the groundwork and the committee would make it happen.

The committee will work with a group of expert advisors across the next 12 months and beyond to advance a functional and effective town management model. What are the advantages?

- There is much value in collective thinking and a broad perspective. Also in cooperative strength for obtaining funding and making things happen, and spreading the load.
- Individual groups and fraternities will benefit from direct representation.
- Overcoming the issues around availability and commitment is major hurdle – flexibility is the key
   the ability to perhaps appoint a proxy or to step down and enable another group member to step up provides for continuity and surety.
- Concerns of individuals around being singled out for criticism can be greatly overcome by the value of group representation.
- Other non-voting members of the group should also be able to attend by request from time to time to present ideas, lobby for funding, or to raise specific issues or concerns.

Groups should be able to request committee discussion with experts in certain fields around an issue or need specific to their group – this could be arranged online.

Identified interest groups could include:

- o Commerce local business owners & operators and those with an interest in business development, Wi-Fi hub, employment, training etc.
- o **Tourism /Marketing/ Major Events** those with interest or investment in tourism operations, promotion or activities or with expertise or interest in marketing and major events.
- o The Arts those involved in art related businesses and activities, programs or groups and development of the community's arts base which includes photography, film-making, music, fabrics, mosaics, painting, metal-art, sculpture, lapidary and jewellery making.
- O **History & Preservation** those with dedicated interest in the preservation, display and presentation of Andamooka's history.
- o **Town Development and Planning** those with interest and expertise in the formalities of planning, development, and property management.
- o **Projects & Maintenance** those with interest or actively working in project development, management and maintenance general and asset

o Community programs and fundraising/events, including youth and seniors, health, safety, education and skills development as well as activities for fundraising and community events that promote wellbeing and social interaction - those with interest and skills in the development and on-going retention and delivery of community programs.

o **Opal Miners** – those with a direct interest in opal mining and on-going promotion and retention of this industry and associated programs and activities. This approach will give the town a body of

This approach will give the town a body of representatives who are actively involved and invested in the town.

# • Two positions for individuals that have skills to take on vital roles:

- O Chair this could be an independent chair holding a casting vote.
- O Treasurer an individual backed by a vice -treasurer, a local book-keeper and the town office who would work with a registered accountancy firm to oversee and present the financials, budgets, records and reports. This role maintains the integrity and transparency of our financial management.
- Advisory Collective this group of experts would:
- O Be familiar with the town, entity, committee, and administration team
- o Assist with and advise on, governance and town management, finances, legals, insurances, property management, tourism, business development, projects and compliances and more.
- O Be available for meetings from time to time and to assist as needed.

This is nothing new. APOMA have had essential assistance from various experts over many years, but this approach essentially brings them 'into the team'. By using expert advice, we help Committee members do their job well.

This proposed new approach to town management has the 'in principle' support of the OCA. It can only work successfully if it gets the backing of community.

It's crunch time people.

# **Maintenance & Project update**

It appears that we are getting on top of the outstanding maintenance around town with very few issues raised over the last reporting period.

### **Caravan & Camp Ground:**

- On separate nights, each of the coin operated shower money boxes were ripped off the wall of the ablution block and stolen. This has been reported to the police & an official report completed. This senseless act will come at significant cost to the community to fix and in the meantime patrons at the ground and several locals are without shower amenities.
- We are currently sourcing replacements which use tokens rather than coins to discourage this type of behavior in the future.
- The claim form for insurance to cover part of the costs to replace the fused septic transfer pump has been lodged.

### **Community Hall Complex:**

On-going work in the hall:

- Painting of the hall interior is continuing.
- Air curtains for fly/insect control will be installed on entry points into the hall.
- No other issues reported.

#### Café premises:

• Up & running with no maintenance issues reported.

### Community kitchen:

• An air conditioner has been installed & commissioned.

### **Community Bus:**

No issues reported



#### ANDAMOOKA BILL'S STORY SUPPORTS MEN'S POSITIVE MENTAL HEALTH

Australian men's suicide rate is three times as high as that for women and that is why the Ebook *Andamooka Bill and the Lights on the Hill*, released this week, is such an important milestone in the promotion of men's informal mental health support networks.

Author Heather Gordon tells the partly true story of Andamooka Bill, a bloke who fronts up each morning for an iced coffee and a chat with his mates over the bonnet of a car.

Referred to as the 'Bonnet Club', these friends share a camaraderie that belies their rough appearance and even though mental health is not on their agenda, they support each other through the tough times.


As Dr Jen Cleary, CEO Centacare Catholic Country SA said, "The Bonnet Club helps blokes take care of what's under their hoods, even though they don't know they're mental health mechanics."

Author, Heather Gordon said, "Meeting the blokes gave me a glimpse into their personal resilience and the importance of the Bonnet Club as an informal support system.

"When you realise that more men die from suicide than the National road toll and mental health services are sparse in rural and remote regions, this should be a call to action."







# **LOOK OUT FOR SNAKES**

Hot weather has bought out snakes & lizards so watch out for these creatures and make sure that you know what to do in the event of a snake bite.

This region is home to potentially deadly venomous snakes including the dark skinned Mulga and the Western Brown variations of which may be orange with a black head, or yellow head with greenish body, some have black bands. Don't confuse this with the harmless Desert Banded Snake which grows to only 40cm long, or the Ringed Brown which is venomous but not dangerous, growing up to 60cm.

A good practice is to keep a large, firm pressure bandage at hand in your car and home.

# FIGHT THE BITE, DAY & NIGHT

Protect yourself against disease carrying mosquitoes.

There is currently NO CURE and NO VACCINE to protect against Ross River or Barmah Forest virus so the only way to protect yourself and your family is to avoid being bitten.

**COVER UP:** Wear long, loose fitting, light coloured clothing, covering as much of the body as you can. Mosquitoes can bit through tight clothing including jeans.
