ATTENDANCE UP AT AGM

Sunday November 15 saw nearly fifty Andamookans invest a couple of hours to attend the annual general meeting of APOMA. There has been a changing of the guard on the Committee with welcome nominations for Mathew Kathagen, Richard Webb and Alison Smoker. Richard Clifford was also supported from the floor, but not qualified to stand, so he has made himself available for secondment at a later date. Donna Waters put up her hand to stay on the committee. She has been acting in the role of chairperson since pre COVID and has done well in the position. Gill Rowley has committed to a succession period and to mentor a new committee Treasurer. She will stay on as admin manager at the Town Office working together with Richard in his invaluable work as projects and maintenance manager, Emma in her support role, and Tanya in the community liaison role. Tanya's work is vital in this Covid environment, coordinating community events, the community bus service and seniors' meals delivery program. There's another example of new targeted funding coming in.

We have to keep in mind that all the staff in the office are paid a small fraction of a modest full-time salary. They are a lean machine. OK Andamooka isn't a big town but to get the same sort of responsive town management through a council would cost a lot more.

Those at the meeting saw the up to date auditor's report. It has been a great year for Andamooka. It's down to Gill's skills in budgeting, and writing for and talking up projects like the town works shed, the community kitchen, the lapidary workshop, the new community recreation and service facilities, vital youth and seniors programs and the historic cottages which will support the Minnie Berrington doco. This is new money coming into the town over and above what OCA collects via the CCS.

The new Dynamite Café is doing good business and staying open longer.

Summer is upon us and we know things slow down a little. The Caravan Park is in for a bumper year (COVID permitting) and Richard has been busy putting in a cashless alternative for people to pay for showers. OCA have committed to replacing the toilets near the Hall with a new whiz-bang access facility that will be more compliant with regulations and probably easier to clean. Michelle continues to do a great job on cleaning and keeping the town looking good. This is such a crucial role. Look up the audit report on the web site to see how much she costs.

We are getting great value from our workers at present and that is a credit to all of them. Luke and Trish each put in over and above for a whole myriad of day to day tasks to support events, community services and keeping our hub generally maintained. Donna is another over and above worker in her role of youth coordinator. This financial year the team will expand to incorporate a community kitchen coordinator and WiFi hub coordinator, each of whom will perform vital roles delivering essential community services.

As a Committee we need to celebrate the new blood and together with the community, work at ways of becoming more efficient and effective in the ways we get together and how we draw out a diversity of opinion and skills. With community support for a new approach, we need to re-work our structure to best benefit the community. We need to also use every opportunity to reach out for new members. Our town is small, but it is changing in very subtle ways. It has always been one of Australia's most multi-cultural of towns and that's something to be very proud about.

In seeking a new look, why don't we 'shorten' APOMA to a public title of Andamooka Progress and leave it at that? *Just saying* ...

- September quarter independent financial report and grant report presented. New grant income to value of \$52,500 received.
- Budget on par with expectations at end of September quarter. Project income to mid-year anticipated to be around \$230K.
- Maintenance and Project Report. Maintenance and compliances up to schedule. 4 major projects to be completed by the end of 2021. Community Kitchen, Rationalisation of Developments, Community Leisure Facilities and Services and Minnie Berrington Documentary / Historic Cottages & Trail.
- Presentation of a more inclusive approach towards town management & committee well supported by those in attendance.
- Discussion on community facilities and services. Food and fuel, seniors' services, leisure facilities, roads and trails.







ANDAMOOKA COMMUNITY PROJECTS

From Inspiration to Achievement

In late 2017, inspired by a group of opal miners, the concept of a local lapidary club was born. They needed a facility to run activities that would encourage locals, especially young residents to take a renewed interest in opal mining, and which would raise the profile of our opal town and become a primary visitor attraction for the town.

At that same time, it was determined that the CDP workshop was inadequate for their needs which included a secure store for town maintenance equipment. The under-utilised grader shed offered a far better facility. A grant allowed that relocation, leaving a centrally located structure suitable for a lapidary work shed.

Upgrading the grader shed to a town works facility will in turn offer the opportunity for further development of community workshops for metal and wood work and other crafts such as mosaics, cold fire pottery and glass-craft.

The grant also funded replacement of the concrete floor of the 'CDP shed' to allow for that to be upgraded for lapidary activities.

We secured further funding for that fit out. We also invested some maintenance funds to meet compliances and incorporated some re-purposed materials to achieve a well-appointed facility housing an active lapidary club of some 20 enthusiastic members and growing. It has already proven itself a visitor attraction and their donations together with club fees will serve to cover the cost of maintaining and servicing the facility.

In late 2020... we have the challenge of taking our community recreational and services facilities from inspiration to achievement by the end of 2021.

We've had the inspiration....the dream... Together, determined the need. We've succeeded in securing significant funding for this project – *so it's time for action*.

Some maintenance funds have been assigned to the project and we're busy looking at other funding opportunities to fit out the facilities to a high standard.

Immediate Stage 1: With the assistance of BHP Vital Resources funding, we are currently in the process of determining which sites are suitable for what purposes. This includes:

- access, both to the site and to services and any issues that this may present;
- suitability for and costs for site development;
- the requirements and constraints around approvals and development;
- design options for facilities and cost those;
- putting together an analysis of the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and the problems and realities of various options including their capacity to:
- meet identified community needs,
- self-support and/or
- o generate income for the community.
- then to short list the options and put forward ideas and recommendations around those.

ONCE DONE... we will take the results out to the community to seek their input towards decision making.

together we will decide upon the location/s and basic design.

That will take the project into the final design phase, and management of final costings and quotes.

STAGE 2: this will be a very intense period. There is just 12 months to complete structural components of this project. This will be a huge task so streamlining this project as much as possible is critical to its success.

WHAT CAN MEMBERS OF THE COMMUNITY DO? This project is about YOU! Get inspired! Get talking! Get active! Join in with consultation activities.

We welcome volunteer assistance for a raft of tasks – be that undertaking some everyday administration tasks to free up office staff to work on the project, assisting with construction tasks, or bringing special skills that are needed from time to time.

FUNDRAISE... in general or for a specific cause. There will be so many costs associated with fitting out and with setting up community programs and activities. This is where so many of you can help.

- So maybe choose a focus that is important to you or your group, set a target, and get started.
- Or perhaps assist with or simply support various fundraising efforts that will happen over the year...
- or maybe set up a 'crowd fund' for a special purpose.

THIS PROJECT HAS THE POTENTIAL TO OFFER SO MUCH TO SO MANY IN OUR COMMUNITY - so together let's consider what we need to achieve from this....

- take the pressure off the Community Hall to be all to everyone. Our hall is so suited to:
- cultural activities including exhibitions which will make it a vibrant visitor attraction,
- educational activities and workshops across all ages,
- social events and fundraisers, 0
- vital community programs for various ages and stages, especially seniors.
- Also to offer services/facilities to visitor or hire groups that will build an income stream to support that facility and create local jobs.

- To expand upon the needs of:
- Youth to have access to far better facilities and dedicated spaces that will offer activities for them to enjoy on an everyday basis.
- Families child-safe facilities to enable greater participation by parents or carers in various activities and programs. That support such events as children's birthday parties or 'mums' social mornings.
- The community to enjoy a range of sporting activities including social sport, junior sport – introductory or training, and social competitions.
- Space to accommodate fitness activities, martial arts, perhaps junior gymnastics, and other such activities including VR activities.
- Space that can offer the reality of indoor markets which can be held across the year.
- Meet the interest in the development of a community craft & produce shop to support local cottage industry to work collaboratively for sales and marketing... with the capacity of taking their products to the world via the internet.
- Meeting the urgent need for an everyday general store, supporting a broader delivery of food and essentials working in conjunction with other local business, and for access to fuel.
- Looking broadly towards other complimentary retail premises that will help to attract visitors to the town and service the community.

All of this needs to be considered within the scope of this project. We're Andamookan's, so with a real whole community effort, we can meet the challenge.





The photos struggle to do justice to brilliantly coloured matrix opal which was mined here in Andamooka and sold in the rough. Once cut and polished, this stunning piece was created to enhance the shape and size of the cut stone.

This young person is struggling to keep up with orders for her creative works with opal and other stones, and so enjoying her career in jewellery making.



it's hard to believe that we are almost at the end of what has been a challenging year for most. Covid restrictions certainly put a dampener on us moving forward as we had planned with Minnie Berrington's documentary, yet the delay provided us with unexpected gains, such as:

- incorporating Lorna Cameron (nee Brooks) into the interviews. Lorna's recollections of life on the field, while Minnie lived here, was invaluable, and she was able to identify one of the dugouts that Minnie lived in.
- finding the site for the post office to be rebuilt as it was in 1947, and being granted permission by local resident Brenton Mussolini to use the building. Re-creating the post office is integral to Minnie's story, as she was the first postmistress of Andamooka, and once we have completed filming, the recreated post office will become a part of the planned "Follow the trail of Minnie" tourist walk through town.
- Richard Hawkins and his team now have more time and funding to build key structures for the re-creation scenes we will film in 2021, and these structures will also become part of the Minnie tourist walk. Since September, we have had the interviews transcribed, and will utilize our time over summer to edit what we filmed. We plan on releasing small snippets of these interviews on the Minnie Facebook page, and also use them on the Documentary

Australia Foundation website to drive fundraising for the project.



"Minnie's personality was a very calming personality; you know I never heard Minnie raise her voice or anything like that. And she was very reassuring in everything she did; she was very thorough and if you did it, you had to do it right. She was just such a pleasant lady – a pleasant, English lady. And I really loved her; I did - she got on well with everyone. While I was here I never ever heard a word against Minnie. Never. No-one ever had a bad word to say about Minnie."



REFUGE IS AVAILABLE IN EXTREME HEAT EVENTS AT THE COMMUNITY HALL

In the event of a power failure on days over 40 degrees and in extreme heat events the Community Hall will be open as a refuge to our community members.

In general, these will be events where the temperature exceeds 40 degrees on successive days with high overnight temperatures.

However, it will also apply to single days when temperatures soar well above 40 degrees and which stay hot well into the night.

So, if your air-conditioning is not coping or even if you find yourself 'trapped' within your home and would like some company, the hall will offer you a place to go.

If you don't have transport or don't feel well enough to drive, please call the office number and we will arrange a pick-up. If there is no answer, please contact the Post Office and they will contact someone to help you.

If you don't feel well. Feel hot and dizzy or sick, then do not hesitate to call the Clinic

Someone will attend to you. Dehydration and heat stroke is very serious.

Sometimes it creeps up on you and you suddenly feel very unwell. **That is the time to immediately call the clinic** or even family or a friend, and someone will find help for you.

We have had a great response and lots of support for the BeConnected Program, seeing ever increasing use of the Community WiFi Hub. I would like to encourage anyone who would like to use the facility and to also take advantage of upskilling through the BeConnected Program.

BeConnected is a Australian Government initiative which provides grants through which we have been successful in receiving help for our over 50's to get online and to be able to confidently navigate their technology, whether it be a computer, laptop, tablet or mobile phone device.

The program offers many activities which may also interest you to learn along the way, or to just become confident with using online services provided by Government Departments, such as My Gov, or even your banking.

The Andamooka BeConnected program will close for the holiday period after activities on Tuesday 15th December, and we look forward to starting up again in the new year on Tuesday 2nd February. The Town Office will be manned for a couple of days a week over that period, so if you need assistance with internet matters, please contact the office and there should be someone available who will be able to assist you.

Thanks to BeConnected grants, we have successfully managed to acquire, a set of tablets and laptops to assist the program, put in place an internet connection and printing arrangements and to set up the Wifi space to accommodate workshops and other activities. Plus we have run a seniors information day for BeConnected which also incorporated representatives from Human Services and the RFDS to promote online government and medical services, and recently two BeConnected workshops for the community as part of 'Get Online Week' activities also funded by the program.

The group is currently looking at producing a Fundraising Calendar featuring stunning images by local photographers, and in 2021 we are looking to set up a Local Online Market Group for our community.

Next year we will continue to seek further grants for more technology and to also to provide future workshops to assist the community with 'getting online'.

I would personally like to take this opportunity to Thank everyone who has supported the BeConnected program to get off the ground this year. So far, we have 13 registered participants who are continually learning new skills and also creating some of their own exciting projects. 

LOOK OUT FOR SNAKES

Hot weather has bought out snakes & lizards so watch out for these creatures and make sure that you know what to do in the event of a snake bite.

This region is home to potentially deadly venomous snakes including the dark skinned Mulga and the Western Brown variations of which may be orange with a black head, or yellow head with greenish body, some have black bands. Don't confuse this with the harmless Desert Banded Snake which grows to only 40cm long, or the Ringed Brown which is venomous but not danaerous, growing up to 60cm.

A good practice is to keep a large, firm pressure bandage at hand in your car and home.

Protect yourself against disease carrying mosquitoes.

There is currently **NO CURE** and **NO VACCINE** to protect against Ross River or Barmah Forest virus so the only way to protect yourself and your family is to avoid being bitten.

COVER UP: Wear long, loose fitting, light coloured clothing, covering as much of the body as you can. Mosquitoes can bit through tight clothing including jeans.

REPEL: Use insect repellent containing DEET (diethyl tolu amide) or picariden and always follow instructions on the label.
