Digging Out A New Life In Wonderland

I visited Andamooka for the first time in 2018, sparked by an amazing trip we did through the Simpson Desert and outback SA in 2017, which we had 2 small kids in nappies, one still crawling and a teen in tow. It was my first experience of the Outback and certainly was testing at times but I loved it and that's when I found myself wanting more of these outback adventures, more of times with the kids around a campfire, seeing history of our state, getting dirty and back to nature, maybe just not so much the dingo eating teens favourite t-shirt though haha.

I've always had a love of the rock and mineral kingdom and this grew in some of my darker moments when anxiety and depression was looming, in a sense they saved me. My passion for opal began around 2015 when at the Southern Rock Hounds Gem and Mineral festival with my dad I was introduced to opal via dads friend, I came away with a bag of mostly potch but I was instantly hooked, holding the plastic bag trying to capture the sunlight on the chips floating around the bag, looking for any flicker of colour. I added to my rock collection, read about rocks, minerals and started lapidary, I haven't looked back.

After my first visit to Andamooka I was amazed at the Post office museum and inspired by Minnie Berrington's artifacts, I knew I wanted to try my own hand at opal mining and I remember posting on social media about Minnie and writing 'if Minnie could do it back then in the harsh conditions with so much less than we have now, then so can I', that was in Sept 2019.

Fast forward to now and my family and I are now living in Andamooka and I can say I'm an opal miner, very much a newbie but an opal miner. I feel very lucky to have met wonderful people here, mentors and friends who are willing to help out, lend me tools and teach me valuable knowledge of the opal fields, which I pass on to my children whilst we mine together. My 6 year old can swing a pick better than me! Being out on my claim I have found has done wonders for my mental health as does visiting the Lapidary shed when I can. I have learnt and continue to learn more to the skill of lapidary and it's a wonderful space to socialize with amazing people, much more than just a place to cut and polish stones!

Prior to moving to Andamooka I felt lost in what to do with myself, I knew I wanted to take my passion for opal further but didn't know what that looked like. Upon moving here, I now have a job, an opal claim, space to think out of the box and create my visions, I have something just for me again. I am part of the Minnie Berrington project, which truly is a labour of love for me, I feel so grateful to be helping bring her story to light. Minnie inspires me everyday as do many of the people I have met here in Andamooka.

ANDAMOOKA PROGRESS AND OPAL MINERS ASSOCIATION

Points from Committee Meetings July & August:

Grants and funding - on track and on budget. Acquittals and reports up to date. New development grant opportunities coming up to continue development of the central hub and campground/ grader shed precincts. Also for roads, trails and community programs.

Financials - the new GST branch system is working well especially as our asset base and development, and our community programs are expanding, as are income streams.

Budget – 2020-21 basically on budget. Surplus funds into projects. C&C Ground income higher again. Bus replacement fund growing

Budget 2021-22 – CARM funding improved. Budget passed by community. Currently on budget, with the Town Budget still being worked on to incorporate new income streams and grants. This will be presented to the community at the AGM.

Committee met informally with BHP to discuss the future of their operations and that of the town, and how we can work together in a beneficial relationship. Very productive discussion included the proposed Borefield connector BHP keen to meet with the community this year. Forum to be arranged.

Committee and community program coordinators met with RFDS consultants to discuss community health and wellbeing concerns and issues. Positive and productive meeting to be followed up for further discussion and action.

Committee meeting with OCA representatives in attendance covered several urgent matters including the ongoing issues with the town water pipeline which is now being resolved, asset management, roads, community programs and projects and funding opportunities.

Andamooka will have broad representation at the OCA Outback Futures forum in September. Six locals are attending covering tourism and tourism projects/infrastructure, community programs and importantly finances and funding as we move towards a new model of funding in 2023. It is essential that Andamooka's unique position in a range of small outback towns is fully discussed so that the town does not come out of this worse off than it is under our current system.

KEEPING UP WITH BUSINESS

ON OUR WAY FORWARD...

Andamooka is busy. There is a lot happening right across the town with lots of new things popping up throughout the town, buses dropping in, the kitchen Bakehouse is busy serving homemade fare to visitors and locals when the Dine-a-mite café is closed on Mondays and Tuesdays, our SALA exhibition at the community hall has expanded again this year and open until the first week of September, and Friday nights are abuzz at the community hall with great food served from the Café.

Quietly in the background a lot of work is going into community programs and services. There are some who might feel forgotten in the current urgency to meet grant deadlines for construction of our new recreation, sport and youth facility and upgrades to other facilities to accommodate the program expansion. But please rest assured this is not the case.

Our Youth program: the new youth facility incorporated in the Recreation complex offers so much more scope for youth activities and a new program is being worked on by youth coordinators Donna Waters and Ali Maleckas, who are also working with the Town Office on the interior features for the youth space.

Our Seniors Program: with around 60% of our residents over the age of 50, this program is progressively expanding to offer more services and activities for our seniors to ensure their wellbeing. Our next seniors' luncheon is being planned for October, where you can chat with members of the committee about your ideas and concerns, and also talk with various service providers to learn more about how they can assist or support you.

Currently, the community church building is being upgraded to not only provide a place of solace and worship for members of our community, but to also create a passive community recreational space that will accommodate a senior's hub where they can meet to perhaps simply share morning tea and conversation with others, maybe join in Wacky Wednesday activities, perhaps join in an art or craft morning, or enjoy a movie together.

Our seniors' coordinators Ali Maleckas and Kath Wilby, together with Ally Smoker and Rodney Mitchell from the APOMA committee, have been listening to and seeking feedback from seniors about what they consider they need and what they would like to see included in our seniors program.

The recent visit by RFDS consultants bought a variety of concerns to light from seniors who attended the informal discussions. *Thank you to those, who made the time to put those concerns forward on behalf of others in our senior community.* Following the open forum, representatives of the APOMA Committee and seniors' programs met with the consultants to put forward our concerns and seek solutions for the future in a very productive discussion. We will follow up results of the RFDS consultation and will continue to press for solutions to be put in place.

So, look out for the invitation to come along to the seniors' luncheons, where you can find out more about what's on, what's available and what's happening for seniors in Andamooka.

Our roads and signage program:

The ongoing town road maintenance service has frustrated many residents, businesses and organisations over the course of many years, but this has improved over the past couple of years with the OCA, Northern Earthmovers and Town Office working together on schedules and problems.

We have gone from a town that looked after its own roads from the mid 1900's. APOMA had a town grader expertly operated by volunteers who drove that and other equipment to keep our roads in good order until the roads were assigned to the care of DPTI. Works are contracted out to a local earthmoving operator, and this helps to support his business which is also critical to servicing our opal mining industry and town development.

However, DPTI imposed restrictions and funding shortfalls on our roads. We have continued to argue that an additional \$20,000 per annum would see our roads maintained in an orderly manner, also for the need to maintain the Torrens Lake Track and the difficult first stage of the track out to Stuart Creek, and other sections currently deemed outside of the works schedule.

These works would assist with economic returns and business development for the town which would result from major events, increased visitor numbers, new or expanded tourist operations, new jobs and the attraction and retention of residents.

This year, the OCA was able to make DPTI road grant funding available to upgrade our local roads and a year with little storm damage left enough in the kitty for the outer roads and tracks to be repaired and tidied up to assist access to local tourist attractions. Keeping these tracks accessible is vital to our tourism economy which is a primary driver for town sustainability and growth, so we will continue to lobby for those to remain maintained.

Road signage: At last, the DPTI 'brown directional sign' to '**Andamooka opal town**' has been erected on each side of the Pimba turnoff, so finally Andamooka is 'on the map', so that tourists and travellers know they are at the right turn-off, where we are and what we do.

Arts Community:

This amazingly talented, diverse and vibrant community is expanding making arts a primary economic driver for our town. As our town's reputation as an outback arts centre grows so will visitation, in turn encouraging new investment and residents.

As the arts community grows, so will their infrastructure and business opportunities. The Community Hall is a developing cultural centre incorporating a new community shop and exhibitions spaces, plus an everyday pop-up market-place to create vibrancy and interest, and a selling forum for local artists.

The active Lapidary Group is expanding and a small grant from Easternwell will fund expansion of their headquarters on the corner of Christmas Hill Rd. and Opal Creek Blvd. The 'Lap Shed' attracts many visitors who not only come to watch, but also to actually try their hand under expert guidance to cut and polish opal that they have found when out fossicking.

We will be working with the Arts community around funding opportunities that can support programs, events, and development to assist growth and marketing. It is the Arts that we believe will become a primary 'arch' supporting our town's future economy and will also bring a greater depth into our already multi-cultural and multi-talented township.

The next critical step:

The vital importance of Community Programs to our town and community is well recognized, and vital to the next development stage, which is to create a vibrant economy utilizing the infrastructure network which has been rationalized and developed to form a sound foundation to build this upon.

Community collaboration and cooperation is the key to this growth, ensuring that we progress at a pace that will make sure that existing business can consolidate and grow and importantly, remain viable, but simultaneously encourage emerging and new business opportunities to compliment growth.

Skills and Jobs: a community program is being rationalized and developed to ensure that we re-build a local skills base to sustain business growth by developing management skills and job ready workers to fill local positions across a variety of pathways and needs.

I wonder if you can see that we are back to where we started back in the 1940's? A strong, determined and resilient community that will rise to the challenge of creating a town that is great to live in, great to visit, and... which has a future.... but this time, not built on a single primary source of income..

ANDAMOOKA COMMUNITY PROJECTS GRANT AND PROJECT REPORT:

Community projects are progressing well. There have been hold-ups with deliveries of materials due to a national transport backlog, and this has extended the finalization by around a month, of the new Recreation, Sport and Youth Centre as well as the upgrade of the community church building to a community passive recreation facility which will continue to accommodate worship as well as create welcoming headquarters for our Seniors and for other passive community activities.

At this stage we hope to see the youth program operating out of the new Centre around the end of October and the seniors into their headquarters a little ahead of that, with those upgraded facilities also available for community use.



This Community Facilities Grant is running to budget and we are in the process of ordering a new toilet unit to service the recreation precinct area which encompasses the grader shed and new rec centre and waiting on news of a grant submission made to assist with the cost of this.

The Country Arts SA Grant for the Minnie Berrington project

has been successfully acquitted and progress is ramping up on the rebuild of the original post office and other historic structures that will be included in the filming of the documentary.

We have recently received a \$2000 grant from Easternwell towards erecting a veranda to the front of the Lapidary Shed.

BHP Vital Resource Funding continues to enable and support development of new services and facilities that will serve to build our local economy.

We thank our sponsors and supporters for their generous and much needed funding towards our towns development and services, and our volunteers for their dedicated assistance with projects.

A BLAST FROM THE PAST

Minnie and Victor Berrington disembarked from the twin screw steamer S.S Bendigo in Adelaide on the 3rd of February 1926, after a 47 day voyage from Tilbury, the principal part of London, England.

With an interest in radios and mechanics, Victor quickly found work with bush traders servicing stations in the north of the state, while Minnie found work as a domestic helper in Kingswood, Adelaide. Her book begins at this point "Come if you possibly can. The train only runs once a fortnight. It's called the Afghan Express. It takes a day and a half to reach this siding, which is six hundred miles north of Adelaide", so read the invitation from her brother and as Minnie put it, "the idea of a settled job in Adelaide faded into a shadow and was replaced by the alluring prospect of freedom and adventure."

One week later with a large suitcase in hand she sought out the Afghan Express, destination 'Wonderland'. It was aboard the Ghan, at a point north of Quorn that she experienced her first taste of bush hospitality. That night unprepared for the cold winter inland temperatures, she arranged a bed as best as she could on one of the trains bench seats, using her suitcase as a pillow and an overcoat covering the top portion of her body, she attempted to sleep. "The train was stationary and I could hear the deep breathing of the engine. Feigning sleep I surveyed the scene around me with half closed eyelids. Four men had entered the far end of the carriage, bearing with them an assortment of suitcases. Each man also had a roll of grey or coloured blankets, fastened with straps. I shivered and wish one was mine. As they caught sight of me their voices became more subdued, but I had already learnt they were shearers. One of them spoke and the others glanced with low laughs in my direction. Apprehension gripped me, but I remained motionless, watching."

"The one who had spoken crept stealthily towards me. Petrified with fright, I shut my eyes and clenched my teeth-frozen, in more senses than one. And then...a delicious warmth stole over me. Gently he had laid one of his blankets across my legs. Glowing with warmth and gratitude, I must have slept again almost at once." The trains arrival at Beltanna was heralded by the sudden chilling of her legs as the shearers departed and the one who had lent his blanket, re claimed it.

"With a few preliminary jolts and jerks, the Ghan resumed it's journey. Constant peerings through the window assured me that dawn was beginning. As we rounded a slight rise of ground, I sat, spellbound with delight and scarcely breathing. Before me a large campfire burned brightly, and round it, their faces ruddy in the glow moved a number of men wearing open-necked blue shirts and wide-brimmed hats. Behind them and silhouetted against the pale lemon of dawn, their humps and disdainful heads clear cut, were the forms of half a dozen camels. Romance and adventure had come to life before my eyes. I to be part of this, who so short a time ago had been typing in a London basement office! As the scene passed out of sight, I thanked the Ghan in my heart for not going very fast."

It was at sunrise, at a point between Beltana and Marree that Minnie Berrington first viewed the country she penned a 'Wonderland'. Unimpressed with the pre-dawn sight she writes, "My expectations were smothered with disappointment. But at that moment the sun rose, and I knew what Rodger (Victor) meant. It was pure magic. A golden light suffused everything, the air was so clear it seemed to sparkle, and the hills were as sharp cut as the cardboard ones that look so impossible on stage. Even the trees seemed to dance differently. The sand was a lovely shade of rose. The enchantment of that golden serenity was so complete that I knew I'd never willingly live in a city again."

That mode of thought set the stage for the next 25 years of her life. By breakfast the train had reached Marree, and after a brief stop at Coward Springs resumed its journey.





LOOK OUT FOR SNAKES

Hot weather has bought out snakes & lizards so watch out for these creatures and make sure that you know what to do in the event of a snake bite.

This region is home to potentially deadly venomous snakes including the dark skinned Mulga and the Western Brown variations of which may be orange with a black head, or yellow head with greenish body, some have black bands. Don't confuse this with the harmless Desert Banded Snake which grows to only 40cm long, or the Ringed Brown which is venomous but not dangerous, growing up to 60cm.

A good practice is to keep a large, firm pressure bandage at hand in your car and home.
