A Letter from the Chair

Andamooka and APOMA are inviting all to consider a position on the APOMA Committee.

Current legislation provides for a community based incorporated body to take on the responsibility of managing our town, and its finances which result from the CCS contributions paid by Andamooka's property and business owners. By taking on the current level of responsibility, accessible local management is in place which also results in more cost effectiveness, stretching funds a lot further for investing in the town and community.

If APOMA doesn't have an operational committee capable of raising a quorum for meetings and decision making, then it can't continue to undertake this responsibility. It is unsure what situation this would leave the town in.

Those who have worked so hard on projects and funding over the past 5 years are frankly worn out... This town, which runs on volunteers and a small salaried group, needs fresh faces and energies to lead Andamooka into its next phase...

There is room for a committee of 10. A number put in place to cover absences for shift workers and part-time residents, but the reality is that forming a quorum of 5 at meetings can be challenging.

Concerningly, following this coming AGM there will be 6 vacancies to fill on the Committee, leaving less than a quorum in place. Outgoing committee members will follow policy for succession, and so will commit themselves to the first 3 months in hand-over roles.

But it is time to refresh and regenerate our town management to continue with the resurgence and sustaining of our township.

Year on year, all people who have been involved with APOMA on the committee have without exception, put their best foot forward and tried, and succeeded, in making a difference.

At times there might be disagreements and controversy, which come with small communities, but which also created challenge often ending in a positive outcome. But nothing has bought down the fierce independence and spirit that make this town unique and its pulse strong enough to thrive in adversity.

Exampled by the pandemic, the whole community looked out for each other. Food and supplies, the elderly's medical needs, shared resources, and care. Care for each other. Generation upon generation looking after this town. Community spirit like this is hard won... and we have it.. right here in Andamooka.

The next generation of committee is now upon us... and needed! Age (18 upwards) is no barrier.

Yes, you need to be a member of APOMA. But.. what does that mean? Being a member means that you see a reason, a purpose, for discussion and for 'putting your hand up" when votes count towards what gets done or not in our town.

What happens to our town if not for votes? Who gets to say what does and doesn't happen in and for our town? The Committee is only as good as the members that contribute towards and support the work they do. Yes..it is actually just that simple....

There are criteria to be met to make sure that this process is done conscientiously and correctly, and that persons entering onto the committee have a basic familiarity with the town and its processes. Although this might prevent some from being nominated for this AGM, there is a simple procedure to follow to enable you to be seconded on to the committee at a later date. So come to the meeting, put your hand up, or let someone know you'd like to go onto the committee.

For now, to all those who qualify, please consider a this a chance to give back by becoming one of the doers within our community, and nominate for the committee, If you need assistance with this, contact the office or a committee member,

Right now... your town needs you.

KEEPING UP WITH BUSINESS

ANDMAOOKA COMMUNITY RISING TO THE CALL...

In a Page 4 article titled 'Over to You' published in the March 2022 edition of 'the Press', we called upon members of the community to take up the challenge and make the best use of our new and upgraded facilities and to form like interest groups to take existing, new and emerging community programs and initiatives forward into a better and more vibrant future for our town and community.

There has been an unrealistic reliance upon a small volunteer committee and office staff to manage community programs and events, whilst creating and managing facilities and services to provide the needs for these. The committee and staff office are there to present opportunities and to then facilitate members of the community to take up those opportunities to build programs and events that will benefit their respective groups, and in turn create whole of community wellbeing.

Over the past couple of years, as the Covid pandemic affected so many lives and changed the way we do things, several groups of locals have taken up the challenge to pull together community programs which had been so amazingly valuable to so many in these unprecedented times, by presenting locals not only with the opportunity to use, increase or learn skills, but to have regular social contact with others and to share and enjoy activities and life...

The seniors' social program has struggled as flu has ravaged members, but they now have an opportunity to move into the renovated 'Old Church' community centre and to make this historic building with a view, into cosy and welcoming headquarters where they can increase their activities on a day by day basis. This expanded program will be facilitated via a new community program coordinator yet to be appointed.

Youth is another group who have suffered a loss of contact and activities due to the


pandemic, and they too have new dedicated headquarters where they can increase their day to day activities and expand their program. We are currently seeking a team of between 2 to 4 paid casual youth workers who will also be facilitated via a new community program coordinator.

The lapidary group has bought together a wonderful program which meets the needs of so many within our community, offering skill building, a place to share ideas and skills, and importantly enjoy lively social interaction. This program has been facilitated via the town office and this support will continue with a new community program coordinator bridging the gap between the office and the group. We thank Greg and his small team of primaries, for their dedication and work which has made this program so successful.

Another group with a new and vibrant team leading the challenge, is the Andamooka Collective – a group of amazing local artists and crafters, who are now reaching out to all within our talented community to join with others in the group, to build a base and a program that will benefit all forms of artists – inclusive of musicians, fabrics, culinary, photography and film-making and other forms of art, to get involved and to create a broad and vibrant arts program of events, exhibitions, collective marketing and funding and to make use of the new 'home base' which will offer benefits both promotional and sales, to those involved in Andamooka's growing broad range of cottage industry.

A recent addition has been the 'Hub Community Garden Group', coordinated by Debra Mundy, which has been busy working on restoring and revitalising the community gardens around the Hub Precinct. Anyone with an odd hour or two to spare, and who likes mucking around in gardens, is encouraged to drop down to the Hub and join in the activities.

Work is about to start on construction of the new Community Produce Garden which will be located at the Recreation Precinct, and will be progressively developed in a quest to produce fresh seasonal produce for our community to be sold via our new Community Shop at the hall. The Shop is progressively coming together, and will offer a great service to the town and to visitors, with an open and accessible 'front of office' for a whole range of information and services, as well as sales of local products, and the intention to offer basic café fare on Mondays and Tuesdays.


MAINTENANCE & PROJECTS UPDATE

All in all it's been a slow three months during an unusually cold winter. Our CDP crew has shrunk considerably as we trudge on through the fallout from the covid pandemic and a few other health issues. But, the good news is that we currently have three dedicated CDP participants that all regularly put in volunteer hours beyond their obligated

requirements and so they are progressively achieving so much for our town and community. Feel free to say g'day and compliment them for a job well done.

Recreation Facility:

• The building itself has been completed. The toilet block is however holding us up. It was late to be delivered due to the manufacturers Covid problems and we are now finding it incredibly difficult to engage a civil engineering company to

undertake the design engineering for the septic system. This is I'm assured, also a result of the pandemic & demands from major road works projects throughout the state tying up civil engineers. We continue to follow this up.

Community Hub complex:

- We also have a hold up on the supply of the new tank for the splash pad. We have decided to cancel the order and go with another company, so hopefully we will have it commissioned before the weather heats up aiming for the usual opening date on the October long weekend.
- The Hall interior painting was done in time for SALA and due to this year's bitter cold, we have installed two 'test heaters' in the seating space and will monitor effectiveness for the next couple of months with the view to having the hall better heated for next winter.
- The new community garden group is doing a great job of improving the gardens around the Hub space. Many thanks to Deb and her volunteer crew.

Maintenace & Projects Update - Continued

Community bus:

• Covid deep cleaning is continuing prior to the bus being used on Thursdays.

Lapidary Workshed:

• The steel has finally arrived for the new front verandah and a contractor engaged to erect, so that will progress during the next month and just in time as summer draws nearer.

Playground solar system:

• The batteries that support the solar system for the playground toilets, BBQ & lighting around that space finally failed in July. Replacements are in short supply but we have managed to source a solution which is being installed and so the system should all be operational again by month end.

Pump Track:

• Most of you would have noticed that we have taken delivery of the new pump track components – they are those large stacks sitting at the campground. The initial groundwork to level the site has been completed, and we are sourcing quotes to lay an artificial turf surface after which we can begin assembly of the track. So hoping that this might be in place for the October long weekend....

Old Church Community Centre:

• The restoration of the old church has been completed and it now has a new ambulant toilet facility and septic system installed. Electrics and plumbing have been upgraded but a few more cosmetic tasks remain for completion. Namely the

new kitchenette fit-out & paving the front verandah, which will be addressed as time and access to materials allow. We are keen for some volunteer help to help tidy up the interior including repainting the walls and helping to remove the old kitchen bits, as well as to assist with paving.

With food prices rising and availability of produce diminishing.. why not grow our own????

Did you know that nutritious and delicious micro-greens grow from seed to table in around 14 days – and when fresh harvested are at peak for both goodness and flavour? Imagine if we had these available to purchase, fresh picked daily, at our own community shop....

Did you know that tasty tomatoes, and a range of herbs can be grown year-round in Andamooka?

That sprouts of all types are so easy to grow and offer a yearround fresh crunch to all sorts of dishes and great in sandwiches and wraps, or on top of soups...? Oh.. and they are good for you

Or, that just 6 mushroom growing pods would cover our community demand on a day by day basis, and that growing our own can offer a wide variety of fresh and flavour-some mushrooms?

In addition, there is such a wide variety of seasonal vegetables and fruits that can be grown right here, to be picked fresh to order and then sold at very affordable prices to locals via our community shop and to local business - with surplus being made available to visitors and tourists.

With food getting harder to source and prices soaring... the question has to be asked, 'Why aren't we working together to make fresh affordable fruit and vegetables available 7 days a week... a reality?'

We have the space, equipment and resources in order – We have start up funding in the bank which can assist with

constructing garden beds and purchasing fruit vines and trees...

The only thing stopping this become a reality is manpower... or person-power... We need a bunch of volunteers to offer a couple of hours once or twice a week to help make this happen.. and getting out into the fresh air and sunshine... sampling the produce.. enjoying the company of others and planning what to plant and nurture next... Plus we need a coordinator – this could be a shared paid position...

The draft Lake Eyre Basin Strategic Plan is designed to protect and manage the resource.

Do you see yourself in the plan?


Works were available for purchase. Transactions were handled through the Dine-A-Mite Café.

SALA was dismantled on the 3rd of September and in its place, new exhibitions which will be ongoing either themed or featuring individual artists and crafters.


So, drop by the Andamooka Hall, grab a refreshment at the café and journey through the diverse collection of work on display from some amazing locals.



HEALTH, WEALTH.... & HAPPINESS – go hand in hand...

Wellbeing is the term generally applied to individuals and communities as the major goal to achieve when developing community lifestyle programs, services and connections.

When these three vital elements are functioning well, serving the needs of communities, with opportunities built into them for personal development, social connections, skills development and the chance for earning financial returns, and essentially enjoyment, then you will find wellbeing....

When there is a sense of wellbeing, people tend to be healthier, both physically and mentally, also to have a sense of purpose and place, and some may be working towards supplementing their income, or developing a career, so in general they are happier and more socially inclined.

To help the community build and run community programs, services and connections is a core purpose and value of APOMA. The committee and town office workers have been busy putting in place the foundations to develop core community programs which will assist with meeting the needs of core groups within the community, and, in turn offering the opportunities for those groups to develop and nurture wellbeing...

Let's individually look at our core programs which are currently under development ... but in recognising that they are anything but mutually exclusive — you will see that they interact with and support each other...

Andamooka Lapidary Program — this successful program, managed by volunteers, has become a model for other community groups to follow... and it is well along the way towards achieving the goals it set out in terms of reviving interest in opal mining, cutting and polishing, and in gems and stones of all types, and jewellery design and making.

However, the program's most beneficial achievement for the community is that it has created a place for social connection — a productive and happy place for people to meet, connect, share skills and simply enjoy what they are doing. The bonus is learning and honing the skills of lapidary and jewellery making.

This program has a primary coordinator who is supported by a core group of 'lap group' members, with support from the town office including grant assistance and facility and equipment development and maintenance. Thanks to the dedication of the core group, this approach works!!! It is a model that is being used for getting other community programs up and running.

Andamooka Community Gardens Program – this program is developing under the care of a program coordinator and a small but very enthusiastic team, and although currently focused on the Hub gardens, and these are looking good.

The gardens program has endless opportunities, including producing fresh fruit and vegetables for the community. The gardens team welcome anyone who would like to join the quest to build a productive and attractive outdoor environment for the community to enjoy...

Andamooka Collective —development of this emerging group is being led by a team of local artists who are dedicated to promoting Andamooka as an artist's destination full of vibrancy, with regular exhibits and workshops, and places for artists and artisans to display and sell their wares. SALA is the primary annual event for the group and many of those artists are forming the Collective to have regular exhibits, pop-up stalls and collective internet sales, and enjoying the benefits of a cooperative approach.

The Hub offers so many opportunities and the new Andamooka Community Shop and Information Centre, based in the Community Hall Complex will combine aspects that will grow to support the Collective, service the town and provide income opportunities for many Andamookans.

Andamooka Community Shed – this progam will be integral to the new Andamooka Skills Training Centre, located in the Recreation Precinct. Offering a range of opportunities for sharing casual skills with more formal skills development for job readiness. It will encompass 'Men's Shed' style Community Shed activities, as well as offer access to a range of equipment that can be utilized by community members to assist them with building cottage industry within the town and to make an income. There are a number of skilled locals who have put their hands up to assist locals to learn skills and try their hand at metal and wood work, mosaics and working with fabrics.

HOWEVER... all of this can only happen if we get 'bums on seats'... It relies on members of our community stepping out of their isolated Covid bubbles and getting back to a happier, healthier life and joining in with others to make these programs work – offer their skills and share them with others.

EVERYONE IS VALUABLE... You don't need to be skilled, just enthusiastic and happy to volunteer a couple of hours a week, which will make a make a massive difference to a program's success, and in turn foster community wellbeing. Your personal wellbeing will benefit too...

RE-BUILDING COMMUNITY PROGRAMS AFTER COVID...


Three other critical community programs which have been affected badly by Covid across the past two years, but which are about to resume activities in their new greatly improved facilities are the:

Andamooka Seniors Program – Seniors have new quarters at the renovated 'The Church Community Centre' . The RFDS will be visiting regularly and will be running a series of health information and activity days for seniors and other interested residents. Seniors will have more freedom to meet casually any day of the week, or in planned groups for a much broader range of activities, or to simply a catch-up with friends over a cuppa...

Andamooka Youth Program — the new facilities at the Recreation, Sport and Youth Centre offer so much more for youth. They finally have an all-weather sports court, and with plans to develop a media centre within this complex, there is real opportunities for youth to develop skills across media and technology. The new training centre will be located adjacent to the 'Rec Centre' and that will open new and greater opportunities for youth skills development, work readiness, and art based activities.

Andamooka Families Program – this is a program that has struggled to get started. It is a critical need for our community, but has suffered from lack of governments support and 'a place'... So with the completion of several new community facilities, there is a real chance for a program offering opportunities for a range of activities for families ranging from early learning through to sports and music. Importantly it will offer the chance for greater social and cross generational interaction and more opportunities for local support programs. We are seeking interest from community members to help coordinate activities within this program.

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
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GENESIS

- BY WAYNE DRIES

Before discussing the fact and fiction of local history it's prudent to recognise that this is post European settlement and acknowledge the fact that the indigenous people of this region were leaving little more than footprints for thousands of years before Andamooka had a history.

The genesis of the community which developed in Andamooka in the 1930's was really just a by-product of peoples quest for opal. It's doubtful that the early miners initially gave much thought to the viability of a permanent settlement, and probably didn't think much beyond their immediate needs, which were basic and essential, food, clothing and water, shelter generally depended on the ingenuity of the miner.

As it turns out however, a community and town did develope in that order, but dating the chain of events leading up to it has always been problematic.

There are good reasons for this, firstly, the station manager Bruce Foulis was well aware of the strain a rush of optimistic opal miners would put on the stations already meagre water supplies intended for the stock. This explains the veil of secrecy put over the find. Alan Treloar explains the decision. "As we had 3,000 sheep out on that end of the run Mr Foulis sent Paddy and myself out to look after the sheep and look for opal in our spare time. Anything found to be shared between the three of us Mr Foulis as silent partner."

Secondly, there were only 10 people, all connected to The Andamooka Pastoral Station, around at the time to be in a position to comment. Of these, five left first hand accounts of the first arrivals from Coober Pedy, and although the accounts vary somewhat, we can still paint a picture of events leading up to settlement, the time period however remains a mystery because nobody seems to have thought to date anything.

Of the five accounts given, Rose Brooks's was signed in March 1989, approximately 55 years after the events in question. Oxy Nugents' was given in 1975, a few months before his death, 41 years later. Jean Nugents account was later still, because it was written after Oxy had passed away. Nancy Ross (maiden name Foulis) was the managers daughter. Her account was given in June 1996, 62 years later.

Only Alan Treloars account was given while still working in the region, written while working at Purple Downs Station. He was also the book-keeper for Andamooka Station so should have been accustomed to recording factual information. For these reasons it is his version of events that has been most heavily relied upon for the writing of this article, though the others are naturally afforded consideration.

It is a generally accepted fact that the floater in question was picked up in August 1930, the 29th is the date most often given. While there are no guarantees that this was the first time opal had been spotted in the vicinity, there can be no doubt that it was this find, that set in motion a chain of events that led to the field being developed.

It is recorded that Sam Brooks showed the floater to Bruce Foulis when he next visited the homestead, this would put the time period into September 1930. Foulis inspected the site of the find on One Tree Hill with Paddy Evans and more opal traces in the form of floaters were found on the spot.

As already mentioned, Treloar and Evans were instructed to further prospect the region. Sam Brooks tried a bit of ground, found nothing and went back to dam sinking. Treloar and Evans stuck to the game plan and towards the end of 1930 the level had been recognized and the search for opal began in earnest. Alan Treloar continues, "Paddy and I worked on and off for about 2 years without anyone coming near us, I used to go in once a fortnight for rations on horseback and take a pack-horse, and as I was the station book-keeper, I used to get them up to date and ride back by horse 25 miles each way."

Oxy Nugent stated in his interview that secrets were kept for quite some time, and Nancy Ross explained "The discovery of opal on One Tree Hill was kept quiet for some time because of lack of water."

If Alan Treloars 2 year time period is correct, the time period gets pushed forward to late 1932, ruling out the 1931 time frame. Keeping secrets, especially where opal is concerned is a tricky business, and it was inevitable that word of the find would eventually get out.

Of the 5 informants we have, Nancy Ross makes no comment on who was responsible, Rose Brooks recalls a boundary rider being the culprit, while Alan Treloar, Oxy and Jean Nugent unashamedly name Paddy Evans, adding that an excessive consumption of alcohol was involved, surprise, surprise. Alan Treloar "As to what I heard when he was down he whispered in the ear of the local priest amongst others and about 4 of the Port Augusta adventurers hot footed it up, loaded with equipment to have a go."

Rose Brooks claimed 5 men arrived but didn't name them. Oxy Nugent claimed 4 men arrived and named them as George Scharenberg, Val Lethbridge, Kim Stevens and Ern Bothwell. Jean Nugent also supports the 4 men version, but names George Taylor, not Kim Stevens as one of the four.

The 4 possibly 5 men arrived at the homestead and were met by Bruce Foulis. Oxy Nugent tells what transpired, "...you leave your car here and I will deliver your mail and rations and whatever else you need until you explore the place properly."

Alan Treloar adds, "...they contacted Mr Foulis and he agreed to show them the place provided I was to work with them and receive an equal share of the findings to be split. They stopped for about 3 months and we all worked like slaves, sank holes all over the place, found little opal but they wore themselves out and went back to the Port, our syndicate bought what opal they had for 50 pounds. Later opal was found all round their workings, they were in too much of a hurry looking for a fortune."

Oxy Nugent also stated they stayed for about 3 months. If the information given thus far is correct, the arrival and departure of the Port Augusta miners pushes the time zone into 1933 and coincides with rumours beginning to circulate around Coober Pedy of a newly discovered opal field in the state.

Finding the order in which the first Coober Pedy miners arrived in Andamooka, isn't difficult, they are almost unanimously recorded in several references. The first to arrive were Albert Wainwright and George Claughton, who arrived from the north of the field with a string of four camels. The next three to arrive about one week later were Bill Hallion, Minnie Berrington and George Malycha, who arrived via the homestead. After that, it depends on who's account you read.

By dating the arrival of one of those five, we should be able to verify the required time period, and the rest, as they say, is history. Bill Hallion and George Malycha left no known account of their arrival here, nor did George Claughton though Minnie recalls him passing through Coober Pedy with a string of camels a year or so before his arrival in Andamooka. Albert Wainwright left no known account, but was placed in Laverton Western Australia during the Easter period of 1932 by Tom Ryan, one of the early Coober Pedy miners. He was, according to Tom, part of a six man gold prospecting party equipped with over a dozen camels.

This is where Minnie Berrington's literary legacy comes into it's own. Her newspaper and magazine articles were written while she was living and working on the fields and her book 'Stones of Fire' is a more detailed reflection of the same period. Though not intended as a history book, it is by default the best first hand reference relating to the early history of both Coober Pedy and Andamooka available. The down side of it not being intended as a history book is that once again it is bereft of dates and time periods.

In his book "Opal Men", which was intended as a history book, Vin Wake makes the comment of Minnie Berrington's book 'Stones of Fire', that "it's value is marred" by her use of psuedonyms. It could be argued that it's author was mindful of the privacy of the individuals involved, as was her nature. In any case, Mr Wake's opinion didn't deter him from using much of Minnie's information from that time period for his own book, much of it suspiciously re-worded.

There was a method to Minnie's choice of psuedonyms as if providing clues for anybody prepared to look for them. For those reading her book, the following list may be of some assistance in the Andamooka portion of it. Eleven of the seventeen people named were ex- Coober Pedy miners.

Because events in 'Stones of Fire' aren't dated our only option is to track Minnie's movements leading up to her arrival in Andamooka by dated information from other sources. For example, we know she was in Coober Pedy in late 1932. An interview with Ernestine Hill appeared in the Sunday Sun and Guardian on 7th August 1932. Of her articles written for the Adelaide Chronicle, two were published late in the year, Soap Making In a Tent, on 17th November 1932, and Yuletide in Coober Pedy on 8th December 1932. In the last article Minnie comments "I think Christmas falls on a Sundaythat's lucky being also mail day." Christmas Day did fall on a Sunday in 1932, confirming it was penned the year it was published.

We know Minnie was still in Coober Pedy in early 1933, her name appears on the electoral role dated 11th January 1933. Almost three months later after a stint of mining with her brother Victor at the 5 mile field, and a week long visit to Port Augusta to have an eye injury treated, she went into a mining partnership with Bill Hallion. This is confirmed by the Miners Rights Register showing they were both issued Rights on the 3rd April 1933 at Coober Pedy. Bill Hallion receiving Right No- 5844 and Minnie Berrington Right No- 5845. The formation of this partnership is mentioned in her book, "The utility allowed me to range further afield than if I'd had to walk, and Mac (Bill Hallion), who was on the move like everyone else, came into partnership with me to try some of the surrounding workings."

We now have two sources of information, both Minnie Berrington's, her book and the April 1937 edition of the British monthly magazine The Wide World, both give accounts of this period. In the magazine article she states they worked, Specimen Hill, The Company's and the Crater. In her book she includes Black Point and The Jungle, adding "in fact, to most of the outside workings except the really distant ones." Of Minnie Berrington's two references, The Wide World article gives a detailed account of a following trip to Adelaide, but doesn't note the time of year. Her book merely mentions that she made the trip, but gives the time of year the trip was made, "Christmas was near again" and then, "Thinking that a short holiday might change my luck, I joined the little flow of southward bound travellers." Before she left, she mentions, "For some time there had been a persistent rumour of a mysterious new opal field in South Australia."

Reading her book the impression taken is that she and Bill Hallion learnt the exact whereabouts of the new field upon her return to Coober Pedy a few weeks later. In The Wide World article she claims that they learnt of the new field on the way to Adelaide between Kingoonya and Port Augusta. Jean Nugent claims they learnt the location from a jewellers shop in Gawler Place, Adelaide. In the magazine article she reveals, "Our informant told us exactly where the place lay, but swore us to secrecy concerning the source of our information." Respect for her sources request for anonymity could explain the conflicting accounts, and who could blame her?

Which ever was the case, it's now January 1934 and both she and Bill Hallion know where the mysterious new field is located, while the rest of Coober Pedy's population speculate. From her Wide World article, "The old-timers were already busy with guesses- and some of them came very near the mark! About two years previously, they recalled a buyer had written to someone at Coober Pedy stating that he had purchased opal found on a station called Andamooka." This would have been Ernie Sherman. According to his son Greg, his father met Alan Treloar at the boundary riders hut in Andamooka and purchased opal from him in 1932. This information also puts our time line very near the mark.

Being the adventurous individual she was, and by now a seasoned "opal digger" after 7 years on the field, trying out a "secret field" was always going to be an irresistible temptation. Bill Hallion was equally enthusiastic. Firstly however practical matter needed to be considered and preparations made.

From her book, "There was a Mr Woodlock (George Malycha) of Coober Pedy. He liked prospecting and he had a large truck. When he heard our inside information, he elected to come too." The preparations for their trip were completed. "In less than a week the fully loaded utility and equaly well loaded truck started on the trip to Andamooka."

This should put their departure time to around mid to late January 1934, and even allowing them a full week to make the trip, they should likely have arrived by the end of that month, early February at the latest. From the best of the information provided to date, it seems reasonable to suggest their arrival time to be around late January to early February 1934. Albert Wainwright and George Claughton arrived the week before, making late January 1934 the most plausible time period for the arrival of the first of the Coober Pedy miners.

The Miners Rights Register records Minnie Berrington receiving Right No- 4326 on 26th February 1934. Bill Hallion was issued Right No- 4325 on the same day. George Malycha was issued Right No- 6211 on the 14th February 1934. All were issued from non-Coober Pedy registry offices confirming all three had arrived by that time. The electoral role for the 2nd July 1934 records Minnie Berrington being in Andamooka via Pimba, occupation, prospector.

Now! When did a community begin to evolve? Assuming that five people make a community, necessity would dictate the need for joint decisions being made for the good of all, thankfully Minnie Berrington records that moment. "That same weekend, we five prospectors gathered together to discuss the problem of supplies and mail. Each of us knew that we were up against a real difficulty in replenishing our provisions as we used them."

The nearest we could place that moment, would be end of January, early February 1934.

FOOTNOTE:

Since writing this article new information has necessitated this footnote.

Stuart Wattison believes the four miners from Port Augusta were George Scharenberg, Val Lethbridge, Timothy McInerny and Earn Bothwell, and that they were granted Miners Rights on the 30/7/1931, which casts doubt on Alan Treloars 2 year time frame. Also what was, the Wharf Hotel, now Hotel Augusta was the likely pub at which the news leaked out. Typically Stuart had provided evidence which supports this view.

Jenny Davison of Coober Pedy has also gratefully provided much information about Albert Wainwright including an article from the Western Argus dated Tuesday 7th April 1931 which indicates Tom Ryan was one year out with his dates. Albert Wainwright was in Laverton in the Easter of 1931 not 1932. While this new information doesn't alter the date of settlement it does plug a few holes in our history and emphasises the importance of a traceable time period through Minnie Berrington.
